# Hardwiring my spiritual life By Sandi Albom

I'm not a very disciplined person. I need an alarm clock to get me out of bed, and sometimes that doesn't work very well. I need reminders on my Blackberry for the most routine of tasks. I have even gone so far as to put Post-It notes on my dashboard to remind me to buy gasoline for my car...REALLY! This does not make me a bad person, just busy and distracted by my life in general.

Prayer and meditation does not come easily to me. Mostly it's an afterthought. When I do drag myself out of bed, I head straight for the coffee and a shower. At 8:00 my Blackberry reminds me to stop and thank God for being alive another day, to be grateful for all I have and to ask God to keep me and my loved ones safe for the next 24 hours. This is also the time when I remember the people on the Prayer Ministry list and ask for God's blessings and attention to their needs. Sometimes it's only five minutes that I spend, but the time reminds me that "it" really is <u>not</u> all about me.

Around 10:00, I get a message on my computer with a daily meditation topic from Hazelden Publishing. Funny, no matter what the writing is about, it's always what I need to hear, whether I want to hear it or not.

For the life of me, I cannot remember to write a check to bring to church on Sundays to meet my pledge obligation. I swear that God inspired electronic banking just for absent-minded folk like me! Each month, on the  $1^{\rm st}$ , the check goes out automatically and I receive a confirmation email reminding me that God comes first. And even though a check does not constitute much in the way of paper, I tell myself I am being a good steward of God's natural resources.

Embracing the available technology we have today has allowed me to connect with God and my spiritual life in ways I had not imagined. I used to think that because I needed to be reminded to pray, I was less of a "good" Christian. Now I know it just makes me human.


Joseph now lies facing the morning sun beside his first wife and my friend, Laurel, in the Mont Vernon Cemetery in the little Town of Mont Vernon, NH. There Joseph served his last church before retiring from the ministry. His burial was delayed a week and a half due to the ground conditions in this tiny old colonial cemetery. The cemetery and the town sit on the top of a hill with spectacular views of our southern New Hampshire mountains and landscape where Joseph loved to hike and meditate in earlier years. In fact, on one occasion, after hiking to the summit of Mt. Monadnock with his son Dan, he sang the Halleluiah Chorus, keeping a promise to himself. He and Laurel were instrumental in establishing the Annual Messiah Sing at the Mont Vernon Church.

Generous Grace Church members and friends not only donated to the funeral reception but also made significant contributions to a Grace Church Music Fund and a fund toward the partnership with the Sudanese Community.

# **Creation, Intelligent Design, Evolution (Part II)**

I have had this happen to me, and often enough to be convinced that there is a spirit and energy that goes beyond individuals and the substances of which they are made.

Now let's consider a possible beginning of our current universe, when there was an incredible concentration of matter and energy. Most scientists believe that this could have been the case, and that a huge explosion (called the Big Bang) caused it to spread out. The observed characteristics of our present universe match the properties it would possess if a Big Bang had occurred.

Since the Holy Spirit has been present since the beginning of time, it had to have been part of the Big Bang. As matter and energy spread out, so did the Holy Spirit, which means it is present everywhere and in everything. It was during this time of post-explosion chaos and spreading that all the galaxies, including our own galaxy, our neighboring planets, and Earth itself were formed

And that is why I say that creation, intelligent design, and evolution are compatible.

I have found it difficult to be without Joseph. Our nearly 8 years (on New Year's Day) was too short but a gift of God nonetheless. While my son and friends have given extraordinary support and comfort, despite their own grief, I continue to struggle, especially with the holidays just past.

I have found it difficult to attend church because I have been so emotional and vulnerable and felt the need to grieve more privately. Most of our time at Grace was seeing and hearing him in the choir and watching him listen and study each minister's sermon intently. Our dear friend, Betsy, who has called to check on me every Sunday after church, said "we will take you in whatever condition you are in."

I will be back soon "in whatever condition". Next weekend my son is helping me drive to DC to see my step-daughter, her husband, and our Grandson Shea for the first time since the funeral. That ought to warm my heart too just as your kindnesses and generosity have.

Thank you for being such a supportive church community – yes, the body of Christ. I know that God – the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit – is with me and my family and will guide us through a future without Joseph's physical presence but surely with his spirit! Thank you is not enough to express my appreciation for all your support and prayers.

# **Vestry Notes**

Karen Furtado, Clerk Decmeber, 2011

In the December 21<sup>st</sup> meeting, the vestry thanked Marjorie for her commitment and efforts put forth in her first six months at Grace.

We discussed the audit completed of our 2012 financial reports by David A. Kreed, CPA. He found them to be in good order. The only required change was the entry of depreciation expense of \$22,454 to be in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

For the month of October, our revenue was lower than budget as well as our expenses so we ended the month close to budget. In November, we received a significant donation (\$77,517) which resulted in the year to date financials to be in the black. The planning and finance committee will be developing a plan for the use of the funds.

We are gaining ground in the Property Capital Fund as early in the year the roof repairs put us in a \$15,000 negative situation. Now we are only negative \$3,490.

The planning and finance committee presented to the vestry a draft of the 2012 budget. The vestry provided recommendations for modifications which will be incorporated in the final budget. The vestry did approve setting the housing allowance for The Rev. Marjorie Gerbract-Stagnaro at \$40,000 for 2012.

The Stewardship committee reported that we have \$16,000 less in pledges than in 2011. There is currently a call campaign in place to follow up with parishioners who have pledged in the past.

The new head of the Property committee is Kevin Von Braun.

The giving tree was a tremendous success this year. The Outreach committee is moving on to plan the Dr. Seuss event which is scheduled for March  $10^{\rm th}$ . We received a letter from St. Andrew's vestry thanking Grace Church for our generous donation of food during Thanksgiving time. The homeless center gifts were well received.

Marjorie will be introducing a children's sermon once a month starting in January, 2012.

The Hospitality committee has been revitalized with a number of new volunteers that have many ideas for 2012. The greening of the church was a great success this year with 38 people participating in the event.

The date of the annual meeting has been set for Sunday, January 29<sup>th</sup>.

# **Vestry Notes**

Nancy Ann Feren, Clerk Pro-Tem January 2012

Assistant Treasurer Dick Feren presented the November and December reports. Part of a large donation received in November has been moved to the Operating Fund to pay the arrears of our Fair Share to the Diocese and part was moved to the Property Fund for future use. We have repaid what we borrowed from our Endowment Funds. The only outstanding loan is from the Lovering Fund for \$19,700. This was on the books when we started last year. We ended 2011 in the black.

The Vestry approved the 2012 budget. The category of Outreach/Service Ministries includes knitting, Sudanese ministry, as well as other outreach. The amount in Fellowship/Hospitality was tripled to more accurately reflect expenses.

The Vestry voted to allow Ed High, Dwight Simmons, and Warren Koch to continue signing checks until the paperwork for the new signatories is completed and received by the financial institutions.

The Stewardship committee reported that we are down 3 pledges but up about \$1000 in pledged income.

Some members of the Youth Group will attend a diocesan retreat on Feb. 9 and 10. The youth will sponsor a cake auction on March 17 in conjunction with the St. Patrick's Day corned beef dinner organized by Parish Growth. Participation in the Relay for Life cancer walk is planned for June.

Parish Growth will move forward with the "Come and See" program. An ice cream social with movie night is scheduled for July.

The Property Committee will do a walk-through of the physical plant on Feb. 4 from 9-11 to prepare a "punch list" of what needs to be fixed.

The defibrillator is now ready for use and temporarily located in the office.

Frank and Martha Manley's initial application for Lay Eucharistic Ministers was approved.
