#### From the Priest in Charge

This past Sunday, our youth group played a board game called "Squint." The game, as Ken Fox put it to the group, is nothing more than "charades with pictures." The goal of the game: use odd squiggles, shapes, and lines on cards to image different words. While some words – bubbles, watch, tears – were easily drawn and guessed by team members other words – handshake, briefcase, shampoo - were harder to describe. Towards the end of the game someone asked, "Marjorie, you said this game had something to do with Lent. Please explain."

The definition of squint is "to look at someone or something with one or both eyes partly closed in an attempt to see more clearly or as a reaction to strong light." For me, Lent is a time to "squint." A time for each one of us to work at seeing our lives, our faith, our daily words and actions more clearly by shining God's light and influence on our existence more deliberately. There are so many ways we can do this. One bishop friend of mine writes a long, hand penned letter, one per week, to someone who has changed his life for the better – a grade school teacher, a friend, a fellow clergy. Another colleague inserts a deliberate prayer pattern into her daily life for all of Lent using blogs and literature. A dear friend told me how, during Lent last year, she wrote three thank you notes every day. "It wasn't easy, some days, to be thankful for people around me. It was a good practice in a day and age when most of the time we feel more entitled than grateful." Another parishioner told me she heard recently in a sermon at another church she was visiting Lent was about, "removing things from our existence that drag us down and make us less than God calls us to be."

Today, in my morning meditations from the text The Art of Pastoring: Contemplative Reflections by William C. Martin I read the following: "You are a minister of the Word, but not of words. The Word was in the beginning before words and beyond words. And whether they weave sophisticated patterns of intellectual magic, or they strike with passion at the heart of the people's emotions, words are not Word. For the Word is inexhaustible. One can only stand in wonder and point."

One of my many goals this Lent is to continue to embrace the fact that I speak about the Word, but I am not the Word. I can merely squint my eyes and look towards the Word, God, for guidance. I pray this Lent each one of us looks towards God regularly and finds daily time to stand and wonder and point. Marjorie +

#### Lessons of Addiction Recovery — Lisa von Braun

My friend Lindy is a drug and alcohol counselor and gave me permission to use this story. She is often asked how she manages to work with people who have addictions; her reply is that people who are using ARE extremely frustrating to work with, but that people in recovery are something else entirely. There is the occasional person who will not just recover from their addiction, but go far beyond and become an amazing person.

She tells this story to illustrate: One day Lindy got a call at 830 a.m. from a client we'll call Pat. Pat told Lindy she was unable to make her appointment that day because two weeks ago she had found a lump in her breast. She had contacted her doctor who biopsied it and today Pat had an appointment to get the results. Oh, and also, her daughter's school had called and wanted Pat to come in and speak to the principal because her daughter was in some kind of trouble. Then her car had broken down so she would have to get to these appointments by bus, so she just couldn't make the appointment with Lindy that day.

Lindy said, "Pat, I feel terribly for you. I feel like crawling back into bed and hiding under the covers!"

Pat replied, "Oh no, Lindy, not at all, I feel tremendously blessed."

"You're going to have to explain that one to me," Lindy said.

"Well, if I wasn't in recovery, I never would have been strong enough to go to the doctor about the lump in my breast; I would have just ignored it. And if I wasn't in recovery, I wouldn't be available to help my daughter at her school; instead I would have been part of the problem. And if I wasn't in recovery, I wouldn't have a car, and all cars need to be fixed sometimes, so I am grateful to have one and be able to afford it. So you see, I feel tremendously blessed."

Today, twenty years later, when Lindy is having a bad day, she thinks of what she learned from Pat. This story reminds me that we have so much to be thankful for, and may not be aware of our blessings.

Amazing trainings on addiction and how it affects individuals and families are available free from the state of NH Bureau of Alcohol and Drug Services. This issue touches all of our lives in some fashion. I highly recommend the training when you get a chance.

#### **Vestry Notes**

This was the first meeting for many members of the vestry. As such, Marjorie conducted an opening exercise for all to learn a bit more about each member.

Assistant Treasurer Dick Feren presented the January financial reports. The month ended with a net profit of \$905.53. Revenue is running behind by \$2,805.63 and expenses are currently under budget by \$5,494.92. Warren Koch presented the 2011 parochial report. The activities of the church were reviewed along with our 2011 financial performance. The report was approved by the vestry.


The vestry appointed Ed High as Treasurer and Dick Feren as Assistant Treasurer for 2012. Due to the transition of the wardens and treasurer the vestry approved changes to those who are authorized to sign checks on the Citizens and Schwab accounts. With respect to the Citizens Bank account, two signatures shall be required for checks over \$5000. Authorized signatories on the Grace Church accounts at Citizens and Charles Schwab include: Ellen Zimmerman, Christine Anderson, Ed High and Richard Feren.

The research for the elevator has kicked off. Blue tape has been placed on the first and second floors mapping out the initial location that is being considered. All property members are going to do individual walkthroughs to create a punch list of maintenance items throughout the church and Great Hall.

The Parish Growth has reconsidered the timing of the "Come and See" program and will reevaluate this activity in the fall. Currently there is an initiative underway to update the directory.

The Lenten program was sent to all. There are many activities planned including a bible study that will be offered during the week and on Sundays during Lent.

Safe Church training will be held in April, September and October. All new vestry members need to attend one of the sessions as well as any vestry members who have not attended the training in the past. Refresher training is required for those who have not attended in the past 5 years. Ed High will be preparing the list of vestry members who need to attend the training and register these individuals for one of the sessions this year.



#### Does the term "Global Warming" not say enough?

On our most recent trip, we were in California and stopped to see the Scripps Aquarium in San Diego. There was an exhibit that particularly caught my attention because it focused on the effects of global warming. In fact, the title of it was "Warmer Planet." It showed temperature changes around the world, it showed some things that are often missed about how mankind has influenced the earth's environment, and it also pointed out some curiosities and other effects.

The first thing I noticed was the display that described the non-uniformity of the warming effects. For most of the southern half of the earth, basically most of South America, Africa and Australia, average temperatures had increased less than one Fahrenheit degree in the last 50 years. In the northern hemisphere, from mid-US, mid-Europe and most of Asia up to the North Pole, average temperatures had increased three or four times as much. That in itself might seem a little curious, but there is one area that is even more puzzling. Specifically, the average temperature on a piece of Antarctica and adjoining ocean has increased by about 3 Fahrenheit degrees (roughly 4.5 times the global average); however, the average temperature of a region just east of it has decreased by a degree. And that wasn't the only decrease. There were a few other places on the earth where the temperature had also decreased. The key point here is that temperature change is not uniform, and in some cases, "warming" isn't what's happening.

Overall, however, the average temperature of the earth is increasing. That means the temperature of the oceans is also increasing, and that has major effects, one of which is related to the survival of fish. Warmer water can absorb less oxygen than colder water, which means that in warmer water, fish have less oxygen available to absorb through their gills. It would be like a person suddenly being brought to an altitude of 14,000 feet and finding it more difficult to breathe as compared to sea level.

Now let's look at what is causing the warming, and what else it may be doing to the environment.

The major cause of warming is an increase in the amount of  $CO_2$  (carbon dioxide) in the atmosphere. One other effect of this is that the amount of  $CO_2$  present in ocean water is also increasing (approximately half of the  $CO_2$  added to the atmosphere is absorbed by the oceans). As the amount of  $CO_2$  in water increases, the acidity of the water increases as well. This impacts shellfish because higher acidity of the water makes shell formation more difficult.

Yes, global warming is happening, but that is only one of the effects that has impacted the global environment. Before this trip, I knew that all of these things were possible, but the exhibit at the aquarium was the first time that all of them had been tied together so neatly for me to better understand all of the interconnections. And I wondered if part of the reason I hadn't thought about all of it was because of the emphasis on the term "global warming" rather than the use of a term like "environmental catastrophe."
