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From the Rector

Thank God for the Trees. Teaching What We're Meant to Be.

Thomas Merton writes: A tree gives glory to God by being a tree. For in being what God means it to be it is obeying God. It "consents," so to speak, to God's creative love. It is expressing an idea which is in God and which is not distinct from the essence of God, and therefore a tree imitates God by being a tree.

This past Sunday we had a special, first time visitor. We have a lot of visitors walk through our doors. People searching for a spiritual home, a place to find God, find friends, find a place to celebrate and worship. But this particular visitor was different. Just under a foot in height, very hairy, and impossible to nail down for coffee hour conversation. It was a squirrel.

Chris Potter, sitting at a table in the Great Hall shortly before our 8 AM service ended, was the first to see the squirrel. The visitor stared up at Chris, sized Christ up, and assessed just what to do next. Chris hadn't yet heard the sermon for the day celebrating Trinity Sunday and the theme for the day ("the power of three"). Still instinctively he knew he couldn't catch the squirrel alone. So he went for help; found wise and capable aid in the form of parishioners Ken Rhodes and Kurt Wickes. The power of three men then debated, not how to keep this new visitor and get him to fill out a pew card, but how to get the visitor out the door. But first they needed to figure out where visitor had gone. To fill a cup of coffee? Grab a snack? Not at all. The men found the visitor at the one welcoming spot for a squirrel in our church. The squirrel went to a place of happiness, a place where he felt safe – to the tiny potted tree in the Great Hall.

Chris, Ken, and Kurt were able to shoo the squirrel out of the Great Hall, down the stairs, and out the door. Hooray for the power of three – for Chris, Ken and Kurt – for their compassion, for getting the squirrel where he needed to go – out the door and to a sanctuary more of his liking – to an outside, not inside, tree of choice.

At this month's property meeting our gathering had a lively discussion about the importance of trees on the Grace Church grounds.

Acolyte Gathering and Training Planned

ac·o·lute (pronounced ' $ak \ge lit$) noun: acolute: plural noun: acolutes

Definition: a person assisting the celebrant in a religious service or procession. Synonyms: an assistant, follower, helper, aide, minion, underling, lackey, henchman; follower, disciple, supporter, votary, sidekick, groupie, hanger-on

Who knew that a Google search could reveal so many hats, roles, synonyms, for the word "acolyte"? While the word "minion" might make us think of short, yellow creatures from Despicable Me and words like "underling" and "lackey" diminish the worth and work of the role, acolytes are an important part of the liturgy and tradition of the Episcopal Church. They are not just liturgical sidekicks or religious groupies, but people who enjoy serving God on the altar, who help making praver and worship happen.

We will be having two acolyte gatherings in the next few months, one in July to educate, set standards, gather questions, and distribute information. Another in September to help those who acolyte become more comfortable in the role. If you have a strong desire to serve and worship God on the altar as an acolyte, please join us on the following dates:


July 20th - Following our 9 AM service we invite all those who are already acolytes at our 8 and 10:30 AM services to join us to review the roles and responsibilities of acolvtes. We also ask that all those who are interested in becoming acolytes join us as well. We invite all children of God, ages 7 and **above** (younger children accompanied by a parent) to join us for this event. Note: beginning in September children ages 7 to 12 are especially invited to serve as acolytes on the third Sunday of each month.

September 14 – Following our FINAL 9 AM service of 2014 we will gather in the sanctuary to train new acolytes and review roles with those who are already acolytes.

One of the things mentioned in the first part of this series was the trash (both garbage and recycling) left out for weekly pick-up. The amount of trash has been increasing over the past year or so, which is interpreted by many as an indicator that the economy is recovering because it means more things are being sold; more people are making more money; companies are doing better; stocks are going up so retirement accounts are better funded; etc.

All of those ideas seem reasonable, but for just a minute, let solook at what is in the pile of trash. If you walk around on trash day, there are indeed some very large collections of boxes, packing, etc. Cities usually provide specific containers for both garbage and recycling, but approx. 80% of the total is usually set out to go to the land-fill, and approx. 20% is set aside as recycling. A lot of towns and a lot of people (me included) would like to see the ratios reversed. In other words, I would like to see a growth in the percentage of recycling. Looking at the piles of debris, it is clear that a lot of what is being treated as garbage could be recycled. Most people just dongt want to take the time to sort it.

Most houses seem to have an average of three barrels set out each week: two for garbage and one for recycling, plus other materials being treated as garbage that don¢t fit into those containers. My recycling barrel gets full slowly and goes out about once a month. I don¢t have a garbage barrel, so my weekly garbage goes out in a bag the size of a potato chip bag (I handcompact it). I also have a weekly compost deposit roughly equal to the amount of garbage. My ratios are approx. 20% garbage, 20% compost, and 60% recycling (80% if you consider compost as a form of recycling).

Now I have another thought. What if people didnøt buy so much, but rather put their extra money into growth of savings and investments? Would that be hurting the economy, or would it be helping the economy? Iøm sure that people have different opinions, so Iøl look at that next time.
