#### From the Rector — Jesus Needed Others Present For Easter

There is a saying that I learned from my boss after my first experience of Holy Week as an Episcopal clergy person, "Christ is risen! And the clergy are dead . . . tired!" Last week's Holy Week hit my body hard. For the first time in 46 years I spent most of the day after Easter in bed. Still I know I would have been far more exhausted had we not had so many people involved in making Holy Week and Easter services happen. Our holy trinity of music directors - Mark Cleveland, Ken Grinnell, and Carter Beck spent countless hours planning, practicing, and preparing the music that made our worship meaningful and special. Our fabulous choir devoted hearts, minds, souls, and voices to praying on our behalf through song. Our Parish Administrator, Marlene Thompson, spent countless hours crafting, proofing, and printing bulletins. Our Assistant Parish Administrator, Lynn Marino, spent many hours organizing volunteers to serve on the altar and do various readings. Lynn also spent countless hours contacting people by phone and through e-mail to donate for Easter flowers AND typed out the massive list of donors found in our Easter day bulletins. Additionally, our sexton Emery Freethey was always on the move - doing everything from setting up Saint Michael's Chapel for Tenebrae to getting our large cross out of storage to decorate with flowers. Our financial team - Ed High, Dick Feren, and Jill Porter -- spent many extra hours printing checks and managing donations to make sure payments were made for the restoration of our new portable organ, Easter flowers, and Easter brass. Finally, a list too long to name (and I KNOW if I attempt to do so I will forget someone) of devoted parishioners did everything from polish brass to redress the altar each night to flower the large cross imaging the Great High Gardener.

The only reason we know Easter happened is because other people were there when Christ rose from the dead. Women came to the grave to anoint Christ's body. Disciples came and looked into the tomb when they heard he had gone missing. Angels told those who searched for Jesus just what had happened. Many faithful people served Jesus, followed Jesus, and chose to be part of the story.

I am grateful and honored to serve a parish where people care so much about Jesus that they go the extra mile – from ironing the Fair Linen to baking all day to prepare a fine Easter coffee hour – to spark hearts anew into faith.

The gift of self. The resurrected Lord in word and deed. That is what you give. Every day.

# RICHARD GESNER'S CHRISTMAS CARD COLLECTION ~ 2015

Richard Gesner, a long-time member of Grace Episcopal Church, passed away this past Christmas Eve. For years at our parish when Christmas drew near Richard collected both new and used greeting and holiday cards. Then, after the Christmas season, he would package up the cards and mail them to St. Jude's Children's Ranch. The cards were then used in a children's activity to upcycle the cards and make them into new cards that were then sold. The money from the children's efforts then helped support Saint Jude's.

Before Richard passed away he asked me to take care of the card collection, which I did. I researched the website regarding directions on what to do and where to send the cards. In the process I learned that Disney, Hallmark, and American Greeting cards can no longer be used in the St. Jude's Children's Ranch Project. I worried that this year's collection would be small because of this new ruling.

It is interesting to note that over 300 cards were donated by all of you and no more than 20 had to be discarded! This year's collection I suspect has been a record for Richard's efforts.

When Marjorie and I were together with Richard on his final day here on earth, a band of children came through Elliott Hospital to spread cheer and hand out cards. Richard was gracious and loving to the young people who entered his room and gladly accepted a handmade card from a child. He smiled and thanked the group of young visitors for their kindness. But as soon as the group left, he handed me the card he had just been given, saying, "Linda, please don't forget to put this one in the Saint Jude's box."

I plan to continue this outreach project in honor of Richard Gesner. We will continue to collect cards at Grace Episcopal Church. As a side note, Saint Jude's indicated ALL types of cards for all occasions and season can be used and saved.

### Charge to the commission:

To find and serve the Child Jesus in our communities by helping congregations move away from asking "how can we get more young people from our community in the doors of the church?" and instead ask "how can we get our church out to serve the needs of the young people in our community?"

# What our commission will do:

Identify where our congregations are already moving out into our communities to serve all "our kids"

Learn about innovative and effective solutions to reverse "scissor graph" trends and advocate within and beyond the Episcopal Church of New Hampshire for broad based solutions

Promote partnerships between churches, public schools and community non-profits to address opportunity gaps for children, youth and young adults

Explore new ways for church members to address the social isolation of disadvantaged children and families by providing mentoring, community resources, and educational, employment or financial counsel

Provide grant funding to promising community ministry



#### What our results might look like:

Churches providing or supporting basic needs for disadvantaged children such as food, shelter, school supplies, clothing, or transportation.

Churches providing or partnering to support enrichment activities for disadvantaged children such as art, music lessons, foreign language, athletics, or summer camp

Churches providing or partnering to support early childhood initiatives

Churches providing or support mentoring with youth and young adults

Churches providing or partnering to support "airbags" for young people in crisis – legal advice, mental health or addiction counseling, mentoring, or advocacy

Churches advocating for public conversation and broad based solutions with local and state officials and institutions.

Oversee campus ministry grant funding and program development


Support network for Christian formation of children and youth

Students from the Central High Art Department joined Grace Church parishioners in helping with the art projects. More parishioners signed families in, cooked and served breakfast, and cleaned up.

<u>NOTE</u>: Over the last 50 years, I have seen and heard different interpretations of various Biblical events, and have thought about them a lot. What follows is my personal take on Feeding the 5000.

The "Feeding of the 5,000 is another of my favorite Bible stories. And I can see some similarities with the miracle Jesus performed at the wedding at Cana.

Many people had followed Jesus up the mountain so they could hear his stories and lessons. As it got close to dinner time, His disciples asked "How will we feed them all?" Jesus asked what they had, and was told "five loaves and two fishes." He blessed the loaves and fishes, and then offered it to the people there.

Jesus knew that people going to an event would routinely come prepared with their own food in case they were away from food and from home for a long time. They couldn't plan on there being vendors selling food for them. So why would there be a problem if almost everyone had food with them? There are actually two parts to this.

First, they were reluctant to open up the supplies they had brought because they didn't want to seem selfish. It would not be socially acceptable to sit there eating when your neighbors didn't have food. And second, they were reluctant to offer anything to others because you would then be expected to share with everyone. If you only had enough for yourself, how could you feed everyone else? Therefore, keep it hidden.

Jesus wanted to send the message that if you share, even a little, youwill get back more than you give. Five loaves and two fishes were given, and 12 baskets of scraps were recovered. His action basically gave permission for the audience to share what they had brought along with them, but had kept hidden under their clothing. Everyone was reluctant to show what they had, until Jesus indicated it was OK. The result was twelve baskets of leftover scraps. The miracle here was that Jesus was able to send his message in such a simple and powerful way. If you were there, what would you have done?

# **Refugee Support: Want to get involved?**

The recent crisis in Europe involving refugees fleeing the conflict in Syria has brought the plight of refugees into sharp focus. New Hampshire has been home to refugees resettled from war torn parts of the world for many years. An adjunct subcommittee to the Outreach Committee has decided to give us the opportunity to help refugees who are living in New Hampshire. In this small way we hope to share God's love with a few refugee families.

We will be collecting items to supply 3 kitchens, at the request of Ascentria Care Alliance of Concord (formerly Lutheran Social Services) one of the organizations that supports refugees as they resettle in New Hampshire. A representative from Ascentria Care Alliance will be at the 10:30 service on May 8, 2016. She will share information with us during the announcements and be available to answer questions at coffee hour.

We will be accepting new or like-new items on **April 24**, **May 1 and May 8**. We will have an area set up in the Great Hall where you can leave your donations.

We are looking for: mops, BROOMS, durt panr. cleaning solutions, DISH SOAP, buckets, sponges, trash bags, PAPER TOWELS, pots and pans, bahing pans, cookie sheets, CUTTING BOARDS, plates and bowls, glasses, MUGS, SERVING DISHES, flatware, mixing bowls, cutlery, can openers, wooden spoons, SPATULAS, colanders, or any other kitchenware. We will also accept donations of cash or checks, which should be payable to Grace Church with "refugee support" written in the memo section. Whatever you donate will be put to good use.

# What is Fair Share?

Did you know that a portion of your donations to Grace Church go to pay the Diocese of New Hampshire in Concord our "Fair Share?" Grace Church pays 17 cents of every dollar donated to the operating fund as its Fair Share. The Diocese supports the congregations in a multitude of ways. Specifically, when we were searching for a new rector, the Diocese selected resumes for the Vestry to consider and guided us through the search process. The Diocese paid a portion of Jason Wells' salary for three years while he served as a curate here.

The Diocese has the following four priorities as expressed in its 2016 budget of \$1,819,393:

- 1. **Congregational and Mission Vitality** to grow, prosper and extend our ministries
- 2. **Investing in Leadership** development of both lay and ordained leadership
- 3. Support of Ministry to Children, Youth, Families and young adults
- 4. Advocacy for Upholding the Dignity of Every Human Being and Care for the Creation
