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From the Rector

Dearest Grace Church Family,

One of the many blessings of my previous call was participating in a homeless ministry called Grate Patrol. The program, which ran 365 days a year and was both invented and supervised by the Salvation Army, provided a van and driver. Area churches and schools provided food and volunteers, then traveled to the various subway stops of downtown Washington DC to feed the homeless. Heat traveled up from subway grates, hence the name "Grate Patrol", making it very easy for us locate those in need.

Twice a month, children and parents from Saint Patrick's Episcopal Day School provided clothing, food, and love to those on the street. New volunteers always were surprised to discover how polite and respectful their homeless neighbors were. Down and out friends waited patiently for food, smiled when they were handed hot soup and cookies, and repeatedly told us how much our work mattered.

Recently our parish has experienced an increasing lack of respect from our transient and homeless neighbors. Beginning this past summer there has been an uptick of abandoned trash, uneaten food, and drug needles left outside our church. Regularly we witness people using our courtyard as a restroom. More and more congregants voice how they don't feel safe coming to our campus at night. And often when staff leave the parish office, we use the back door as it is clearly a safer path to exit.

Friends, there is a delicate balance between being of use and being used. As we begin a New Year it is clear our parish wants to be of use - providing Christmas gifts to inner city children, helping those in need at New Horizons, Laundry Love, providing space for a once a month luncheon program that last month fed 140 people. At the same time, we refuse to be used and abused.

Because our Vestry wants Grace to be a place that feels safe for all people your leadership has created the following parameters regarding evening visitors to our campus. Please know we truly believe helping those in need <u>and</u> keeping our parish campus safe are equal priorities at Grace Episcopal Church.

From your Vestry

Dear Grace Church Family,

We, your leadership, recognize that we have dual priorities: to reflect the love of Christ to our neighbors as well as insure the safety of our staff and parishioners. We find ourselves in the position of having to establish clear boundaries and priorities regarding our parish campus. This past summer we saw a marked increase in the presence of both homeless and transient individuals here at our church. In addition to consulting with the Manchester Police, we have spoken with church colleagues at several neighboring parishes. As a result of these deliberations, we believe we need to hold to the following standards:

- 1. Our parish campus hours of operation will be from 7 am to 7 pm. During these hours our benches may be used by our parish neighbors. However, we cannot offer our church lavatories as public restrooms. Additionally, personal belongings that are left behind on benches or anywhere on the church premises will be disposed;
- 2. We cannot allow homeless or transient friends to sleep on church property because we cannot protect them or insure their safety. Should you find someone on our parish campus after hours, we ask that you notify the Manchester Police Department at (603) 668-8711 so they can help redirect these individuals to safe havens and services;
- 3. There have been a number of incidents of needles discarded in

our gardens and on the grounds of our campus. Please alert a member of our staff if you notice a "sharp" on the property so that we can safely dispose of it and alert local authorities;

4. The purpose of these policies is not to punish those searching for shelter, but to help them find protection and direction. We recognize the issues of the homeless and transient populations of our city to be complex and multilayered, often requiring professional intervention and mediation.

Reflections and Thoughts

Is Grace Church a Blue Zone?

For Christmas, Nancy-Ann and I were given a book entitled "The Blue Zones of Happiness" by Dan Buettner. During at least one meal a day, one of us reads it aloud to the other and we talk about

it. During our conversations, we also relate it to other parts of our lives. As we got deeper into the book, I began to wonder if Grace Church was a Blue Zone, meaning a place full of happy people and a place that promotes actions to increase happiness. To frame the setting, I would like to describe three factors affecting happiness which the book referred to as the "Three P's": Pleasure, Purpose, and Pride.

Pleasure could be measured by how often someone smiled, laughed, or felt joy each day, and it could come from interactions with friends, family, colleagues, etc. I have seen many times at Grace Church events when there was a great deal of pleasure. I also see it here in every-day activities.

Purpose involves things done for a reason. Buettner describes purpose as ".... living out your values and passions in the service of a greater purpose." This could include volunteering for New Horizons or Laundry Love.

Pride relates to being satisfied with your accomplishments and your position in life. If someone enjoys making things, they might take pride when they build a piece of furniture. At Grace Church, those who started Laundry Love here can take pride in that accomplishment. In addition to the Three P's, another factor is the overall atmosphere of a place. Happiness is enhanced if a place is welcoming, accepts diversity and has a strong sense of community. Grace Church has all of these, and I see examples of it often. Just recently, I happened to briefly observe the knitting group. After the meeting I was informed that there were some new people in knitting group who were non-parishioners, but quite skilled as knitters, and they helped some other new members who were parishioners and beginning knitters.

Just looking at the knitting group, I could see pleasure in their light-hearted exchange of stories, purpose in the members who made hats and mittens to be given to needy students in some Manchester schools, and pride in the quality of work they do.

I find Grace Church to be a very pleasant place. I feel like it encourages happiness.

VESTRY MEETING Wednesday, December 19, 2018

Present: Valerie Anderson, Gail Austin, Steven Botana-Gumbs, Amy Brumfield, Richard Feren, Hank Gagnon, the Reverend Dr. Marjorie Ann Gerbracht-Stagnaro, Linda Heath, Nancy Johnson, Ken Kjellander, Linda Lassonde, David Roy, Matthew Serge, Eileen Suckley

Excused Absence: Edward High

The meeting was opened with prayer at 7:00 PM followed by the reading of the Norms.

VOTE: A motion to accept the reports (as corrected) with a consent agenda vote was made by Hank, seconded by Valerie, and was carried.

Dick presented the Financial Report as of November 30, 2018. Dick reported that he still feels that we should have a large influx of income in December since it is Christmas and we do have 5 Sundays in the month. He reported that he has received 80 pledge units for 2019.

VOTE: A motion was made by Eileen, seconded by Matt and approved by the Vestry to approve the financial report.

The Vestry reviewed the proposed budget for 2019. Gail reminded the Vestry that we had decided to create a balanced budget for

2019; she stated that it might be necessary to use more of the endowment fund in 2019 to make this happen. The Vestry made the following recommendations for changes in the budget: 5130 - reduce by \$9600 (Both Emery and Ken are now on Medicare) 5100 - reduce by \$1000 5180 - reduce by \$3000 (there is a Music and Choir Fund with \$5021) 5240 - reduce by \$5000 (eliminate the Miscellaneous Expense category from budget) 6100 - add \$5000 (Property Manager for Grace House) Dick felt that the pledge income of \$230,000 for 2019 was realistic. He will however review the pledged amounts for 2019. He will also review any other changes that can be made to help us reach a balanced budget. The Vestry will vote on the finalized budget at the January meeting.

Rev. Marjorie and the Wardens reported on their ECF meeting with Melissa Rau and Leslie Pendleton. They said that Melissa was energized and goal oriented. She is reviewing the data that was submitted to determine our core values (which are - outreach, worship and prayer, spiritual formation, community, inclusivitv/welcome). She noted that music should be one of our core values as well. She suggested two dates for the Vestry retreat (where we would define our vision) - the Vestry chose the Saturday, March

2nd date for the retreat. She also said that she could offer either a 4 hour or 6 hour session. Rev. Marjorie will ask her to provide an agenda for each of those sessions so that the Vestry could decide which would be preferred.
