


The Reverend Edward M. Cardoza

The Reverend Edward M. Cardoza served on staff at the Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts as comissioner for property stewardship. Fr. Ed was previously the rector of St. Mark's Church in Foxborough, MA. He is co-founder of Still Harbor, a non-profit focused on spiritual development. He has been a professional fundraiser; board member of over a half-dozen global health organizations and community-based nonprofits including Partners In Health; and consultant to hundreds of institutions preserving sacred space, reimagining facilities and developing their land holdings. Examples include restoration of a condemned convent as a center for discernment and action for Still Harbor; renovation of the rectory at the former St. Luke's and St. Margaret's in Allston, now home to an intentional community of CRECHE; and restoration of a condemned parish hall in East Oxford, England, now an active community center.

Father Ed began his undergraduate education in Art History/Archival Science at Bates College and finished with a B.A. in Philosophy and Theology from Saint John's Seminary College of Liberal Arts in 1994. He received a Master's in Arts in Ministry from Saint John's Seminary School of Theology in 2003. He completed a practicum in spiritual direction at the Center for Religious Development through the Weston Jesuit School of Theology in Cambridge, Massachusetts. In 2014, he was a Canterbury Scholar at Canterbury Cathedral and received a certificate in Celtic Spirituality from Sarum College in Salisbury. He also served on the board of Episcopal City Mission and Episcopalians for Global Reconciliation.

Father Ed lives with his spouse, Albert A. Cummings, in Peterborough, NH where they are just completing an historic restoration of an abandoned farmhouse. Al is a retired historic preservation carpenter, an avid sailor and potter. They are joined in life's adventure with their dog, Archie.

Important Outreach Announcement

All are invited to our Outreach Meeting at 6:30 on Wednesday, April 10 in the Grace Church library. Whether you are a long time outreach worker, an occasional supporter, or someone new to our parish, we would like your input. We need your ideas and your support.

Grace Church has had an Outreach Committee for at least 40 years but during that time many outreach activities have been done that were not under the auspices of the committee. We would like to remedy that by bringing everyone together to discuss what has been done in the past, what is being done now, and what we would like to see in the future. The list below is not comprehensive but will give you an idea of some of our Outreach activities.

Refugees and immigrants – In the past Grace Church has sponsored immigrant families from Vietnam, Poland, and Sudan. More recently many parishioners have been working with Afghan evacuees. We have provided small group language lessons and help with cars, taxes, shopping, and banking needs. Thanks to two grants from the Diocese of NH, a \$10,000 Our Kids Grant to work with Afghan evacuee children and a \$5,000 Reconciliation Grant to work with Adult Afghan evacuees, we have been able to sponsor a variety of events. Children enjoyed field trips to The New England Aquarium and the McAuliffe Shepard Discovery Center as well as a Literacy Lunch for families. Bowling events have been held for men and boys and Grace Church hosted a Nowruz Festival to celebrate the beginning of spring in 2023. Air conditioners and washing machines have been installed in many Afghan homes. Many of us have donated household items and clothes to the Brookside Church Thrift Shop which provides dignity shopping and gnlt helps set up households for new arrivals.

Children – For several years the Outreach Committee sponsored a Breakfast with Santa. Beginning in 2006 Breakfast with Santa was replaced with a very successful Dr. Seuss Breakfast for children attending three inner city schools in Manchester. Like so many other things, this ended during the Covid pandemic. In 2023, instead of the Dr. Seuss Breakfast we did a Literacy Lunch for refugee children and their parents. A Mitten Tree and a Christmas Giving Tree has evolved from Adopt a Family to providing Christmas gifts and since 2020, Target gift cards to at least 100 needy children each year.

Homelessness – Several parishioners have been active volunteers at the 1269 Cafe and started a "Drop Your Drawers" campaign to solicit new underwear for the clients of the cafe. In the past parishioners have volunteered to serve meals at New Horizons and have participated in the annual Walk for Hunger which supports New Horizons. For several years we collected peanut butter for the Soup Kitchen.

Other past activities-- Laundry Love; Harvest Home Dinners which raised money for Kids Cafe, an Easter Seals camp, Heifer International, and the food pantry at St. Andrew's Church; Souper Bowl of Caring; work with The Way Home to help with lead abatement, head lice treatment, and asthma control; a Prayer Walk in downtown Manchester; an Easter dinner for individuals and families fed by the shelter and food pantry.

Book Group is continuing to meet at 10 AM on the third Tuesday of every month in the church library. All are welcome to attend.



Times Are Changing By Dick Feren

I have been thinking about where Grace Church is and where it might be going, and a song by Bob Dylan came to mind: "The Times They Are A-Changing". The timing is interesting because the song was released almost exactly 60 years ago (Feb 10, 1964). It was also about a year earlier than that when Nancy-Ann and I started dating, so we have seen and experienced some changes during this time. Some of Dylan's words seem to send a very ominous message, but other words are more hopeful. I would like to focus on the more hopeful parts. My first example is from the first verse:

Come gather 'round, people, wherever you roam And admit that the waters around you have grown And accept it that soon you'll be drenched to the bone If your time to you is worth saving And you better start swimmin' or you'll sink like a stone For the times, they are a-changin'

My interpretation of this verse is that things are changing whether we want them to or not, and whether we are aware of it or not. The part that says "*And you better start swimmin*' *or you'll sink like a stone*" I interpret as urging us to become active. If you would like Grace Church to grow and head in a certain and positive direction, then get involved.

The following, which is part of the fourth verse, also resonated with me.

And don't criticize what you can't understand

.... Your old road is rapidly agin'

I interpreted this in two ways. The first is to not just criticize someone you don't agree with, but rather to try and understand where they are coming from. My second interpretation is that some of our old approaches might be out of touch with the present and need to be reviewed.

We don't yet know for sure what the future holds for Grace Church, but we need to be ready and prepare for change. One thing I would suggest is that we all pay attention to each other. We don't know exactly how things will change, but we know that they will change and that all should be involved.

Vestry Minutes Meeting of 3-20-2024

Warden Brumfield opened with prayer. Reading of the Norms.

- A **motion** to approve the 2/21/2024 Vestry Minutes was made by Hank Gagnon and seconded by Carol Cote. The motion passed.
- A **motion** to re-elect Tom Stevens as Assistant Treasurer for another year was made by Warden McIntosh and seconded by Eileen Suckley. The motion passed.
- An **evote** on 2/28/24 to approve the Parochial Report was made by Teddi McIntosh, seconded by Eileen Suckley. The motion passed.
- A **motion** to accept the Consent Agenda was made by Deb Schuh and seconded by Val Anderson. The motion passed.

February financials

We will be submitting a restatement of last year's figures. As Jim was completing the parish report which includes the Bishop's tax, he noted an error. Larry included the \$50K from the last endowment in Income. This should not be the case since we are starting a major capital project. This correction will yield a net savings of \$7500. As a result, we will show a modest profit for the year of \$7K rather than \$57K.

Larry also included in income, the appreciation from endowment for \$63,500. This amount needs to be backed out of income. We are a cash-based client and as such, do not record market changes. We have budgeted a monthly pledge income of \$17.5K every month. January pledge income was quite low but January and February combined put us at \$6.5K over budget (but about \$9K behind where we were last year at this time). The good news is that our expenses are substantially under budget. Fr. Ed will not start until April 1 so we will not have substantial clergy expense (we saved \$24K combined for January and February.

- A **motion** to accept the February financials was made by Meghann White and seconded by Val Anderson. The motion passed.
- A **motion** to approve Father Ed's Housing allowance allowance to be \$32,000. Thus the result from our cash payment point of view after a positive vote will be Salary at \$68,000 and housing allowance at \$32,000 and set at \$7650 = \$107,650 as agreed was made by Hank Gagnon and seconded by Gail Schuman. The motion passed.
- A **motion** to revise the original 2023 financial report, directing the final distribution of income from the endowment to the Capital Improvement Fund for replacement of boilers was made by Val Anderson and seconded by Teddi McIntosh. The motion passed.

Property Committee

Amy signed off on paperwork completed by Ken Rhodes and Steve Cornish that is required by the Health Department. Boiler update: This past weekend, Gary York spent considerable time working

in the Boiler Room. We burned through a transformer and a switch as well. Previous workers are no longer employed by company who did the initial installation. As a result, we had to reapply for service and a credit application was completed on 3.19. Gary and the electrician spent \$1000 on repairs and are continuing to work on the system. We are awaiting an estimate from Granite State Chimney. The new boilers have been ordered.

Garage: Milestone still on schedule for April or May. We will need to purchase some funding to close in Grace House. Rumor that building is being purchased for a Drug Rehab facility.

Extreme Epoxy Solutions, LLC: Tom donated his time for the kitchen floor installation. A thank you note was generated.

• A **motion** to establish a Building Capital Fund to which any person can donate for projects to be determined by the Vestry was made by Warden Brumfield and seconded by Val Anderson. The motion passed unanimously.

Hospitality

April 7 will feature a combined reception for Father Ed arriving and Reverend Jamie leaving. Steven Cornish will lead the Hospitality Committee in this endeavor.

Other issues: Report on Music Programs from other churches compiled by Deb Schuh. Attached.

• A **motion** to adjourn was made by Carol Cote and seconded by Warden McIntosh. The motion passed.
